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IT'S TICK SEASON AGAIN!

In the coming months, here in Pennsylvania especially, we are forced to deal with that nagging pest called a "Tick". If you've ever been bitten by one, you know that most times, it is generally painless. You are more apt to see the red mark it leaves behind long after the Tick has fallen off your body. But for those ticks that like to hang on, here are some ways to successfully remove the little pest.

With tweezers or an instrument called *Sawyer Tick Pliers*, put the tip of the tweezers or pliers on your skin around the tick. Squeeze the tips together under its head and gently pull UP. You want to get rid of the head of the tick. If you grab the body of the tick or attempt to twist the tick, this may cause its head to break away, where it continues to bite and insert its venom.



<u>Deer Ticks</u>, (which, by the way, are carried by mice and not deer), are so small that they are hard to see with the naked eye. However, despite their micro size, these little guys are known to carry *Lyme disease*. Their bites often times look like a bullseye on the affected area. Because they can bite anywhere they land, many times their painless bites go undetected. And so, if you get any of these symptoms after being outdoors you should contact your doctor and ask for an appointment to be tested for Lyme disease.



Lyme disease Symptoms are:

- Feeling Flu-like
- Fever
- Numbness
- Rash
- Confusion
- Weakness
- Pain and Swelling in the joints
- Heart Palpitations
- Paralysis
- Shortness of Breath
- Nausea and Vomiting.

Remember, early detection means quick recovery.

Your best defense against these little disease carrying critters is to wear more clothing while outdoors. When practical, wear a hat, a long sleeve shirt or a coat, thick pair of pants, boots and socks. For the areas that cannot be covered by clothing, lather on a fragrant oil such as baby oil, Olive oil, Vegetable oil, or Lavender oil. Other effective 'natural' repellants are herbs and spices such as Thyme and Cyan Peppers. The idea is to not smell 'human' to the tick's sensors.

If you choose to use a chemical repellant, the CDC website (The Center for Disease Control and Prevention) recommends one that contain 20% or more DEET (N, N-diethyl-m-toluamide) on the exposed skin.

To keep your house, pets, and family safe from further infestations, as soon as you get home from being outdoors, removed all of your clothing and toss them into your dryer

(**not** the washer) on the highest temperature for at least one hour. The heat will kill any Ticks that might have attached themselves to your clothing. And don't forget to inspect your shoes for any hitchhikers before putting them away. Examine your children's body and especially their hair. And don't forget to check the dog for ticks!

Toe the Line - To do what you are ordered or expected to do. One meaning of "to toe the line" (or a mark, scratch, crack or trig [a line or small trench]) was to position one's toes next to a marked line in order to be ready to start a race, or some other undertaking. Other early examples of "toe the line" have a

nautical connection. In the 19th century, sailors were expected to prepare themselves for group punishment by standing in formation on deck and 'toeing the line' between boards—also called "toeing the crack". Another possible source is prize-fighting. The scratch was the line marked across the ring in early "toe-to-toe" boxing bouts. Anyone man enough to enter into such a contest was "up to scratch".

True Blue - Loyal and unwavering in one's opinions or support for a cause. "True blue" is supposed to derive from the blue cloth that was made at Coventry, England in the late middle ages. The town's dyers had a reputation for producing material that didn't fade with washing, i.e. it remained "fast" or "true". The phrase "as true as Coventry



blue" originated then and is still used—in Coventry at least. The blue dye was created from sloe berries and other ingredients, that gave a rich, fast color. The recipe was a closely guarded secret, passed from master to apprentice by word of mouth. They were so successful in keeping it secret that today nobody knows how it was made, or even what color it was exactly. It is believed to have been a sky blue color.

General Safety—Attitude and Behavior

Humans instinctively seek to avoid pain and death. And yet, we may behave in a manner that is a threat to our well-being. There are a couple of reasons why this occurs. The first is lack of knowledge. What you do not know <u>can</u> hurt you!. The second reason we may act in a risky manner is attitude. Now might be a good time to do a quick self-analysis. What is your attitude toward safety?

When asked, some may say they are all for it. Others may complain about any safety effort being made. The difference between the two is one of attitude. Your attitude affects almost all that you do and how you do it.

Have you ever noticed that people who are successful in life, or are just happy, tend to have a positive attitude? And so it is with safety. Look at it this way. . . safety rules and procedures are written to protect you from harm. They are <u>not</u> written to make your work life more uncomfortable or inconvenient. After all, safety equipment and training costs your employer additional up front money.

If you cooperate in safety matters, not only is there a lesser likelihood of you getting hurt, you will not be doing battle with the boss who is just trying to do his job by enforcing the safety rules. In addition, you should feel more confident on the job knowing you have a better chance of making it through the day without injury. Less fear of injury and the boss no longer on your back has to brighten your day!

We are not perfect. Even the best of us can forget or make errors in judgment. To maximize our safety efforts, we must look out for one another. If someone tells you that you are not working in a safe manner, do not become angry or defensive. They are just looking out for your well-being. If you did not know you were doing something wrong, be thankful your errors were noted before someone got hurt. If you simply forgot or got a little careless, be grateful that someone cares enough to get you back on track. If you see someone doing something unsafe, speak up, but do so diplomatically. Treat others just as you would like to be treated in the same situation.

Remember, attitude affects behavior. If you have a positive attitude, odds are you will exhibit safe behavior. A negative attitude toward safety will only cause conflict, stress and, ultimately, an accident.
